Why *Roe* must go: In defense of Heartbeat bills

Kentucky became the first state this year to pass a Heartbeat Bill. Five other states now have followed our

lead: Mississippi, Georgia, Ohio, Missouri and Louisiana.

On March 14, Senator Matt Castlen's bill, Senate Bill 9, the Fetal Heartbeat Abortion Ban, passed the Kentucky Senate on a 31-6 vote after passing the House of Representatives on a 71-19 vote. SB 9 prohibits abortion after the detection of a heartbeat indicates life. God love him! Sen. Castlen (R - Dist. 8, Owensboro area) followed his heart and his mind, and he did the right thing by sponsoring this bill.

If the *absence of a heartbeat indicates death, the presence of a heartbeat indicates life.*

For the last several years, even after many successes passing pro-life legislation that became law in restricting and/or limiting abortions in the states, the prevailing wisdom has been that the time still is not the *right* time to challenge *Roe v. Wade* at the U. S. Supreme Court. People have said that the makeup on the current court remains one conservative pro-life Justice short of a solid majority, which could overturn *Roe v. Wade*.

I used to be on the side of this conventional wisdom; but after witnessing the courage of two other governors who are as Life-affirming as

Kentucky's governor, Matt Bevin, my mind has been changed.

Alabama passed a total ban on abortion this year, and Gov. Kay Ivey signed the bill into law on May 14 amid the slings and arrows of the pro-abortion zealots.

Georgia Gov. Brian Kemp was threatened by Hollywood producers with the loss of revenue amounting to \$9.5 billion in total economic impact in his state if he signed the Heartbeat bill. Andy Griffith's "Opie," film producer Ron Howard, was one of the producers leading the threats to pull all film production from Georgia, costing over 92,000 jobs in that state. Gov. Kemp signed the Heartbeat bill into law on May 7.

How can we *not* support bills that ban or restrict abortion once the baby's heart is beating?

Since abortion was made legal in all 50 states 46 years ago, abortion has become the most politically divisive and culturally obliterating issue of the last 50 years. The National Right to Life Committee, founded in 1968, and KRLA, formed in 1972, were the early-warning sirens for what would follow a nation that allowed the killing of its own children — a cultural shift, glaringly evident today, so dire in consequence; and an issue so politically divisive that both major political parties now are sharply different on how they view life in the womb.

The Republican Party platform, since the time of Ronald Reagan, has stated that we must protect life in the womb until birth. The Democrat Party has, since the 1970s, allowed for the destruction of life in the womb — and today, up to the moment of birth. We were horrified after New York's shocking law passed on January 22, followed by Virginia's decision in February to allow abortion up to the moment of birth and even *af-*

ter birth — even if the child survives the abortion.

After Justice Harry Blackmun, a Methodist and a Republican, wrote the *Roe v. Wade* and *Doe v. Bolton* rulings, he didn't foresee that a massive political backlash that concurrently gave rise to a huge grassroots effort on the part of ordinary citizens would arise to push back against *Roe*. People were shocked and dismayed by the court's ruling that mothers had just been granted the legal right to have their unborn babies killed by abortionists.

Daniel K. Williams, author of *Defenders of the Unborn*, wrote, "But what really made *Roe* an egregious decision, in the view of pro-lifers, was that **it deprived a class of people of their constitutional rights by declaring them non-persons**, something they thought the Supreme Court had not done since *Dred Scott v. Sanford* in 1857."

After *Roe* became law, it became anything but *settled* law, and remains so to this day. Associate Justice Byron White, an Episcopalian and a Democrat, wrote in his blistering dissent to *Roe*, "I find nothing in the language or the history of the Constitution to support the Court's judgement." He also said that the passage of *Roe* was "an exercise in raw judicial power." Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, an abortion advocate, wrote for the 1985 *North Carolina Law Review*, criticizing the *Roe* and *Doe* decisions, that "the heavy-handed judicial intervention was difficult to justify and appears to have provoked, not resolved, conflict."

It's time for *Roe v. Wade* to be overturned. Let us hope that Heartbeat bills will provide the impetus needed to set the course for the people in all 50 states to be allowed — at last — to decide whether their state will be on the side of life or death.

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The pro-abortion lobby is scared and preparing for *Roe's* repeal

Most people know the law of physics which states that for every action, there is an equal and opposite reaction. Well, the events of this spring proved that law to be true especially for pro-lifers.

First, in Virginia, Democrat Ralph Northam favorably described a bill in the Virginia House of Delegates that actually would permit the killing of babies who survive botched abortions. That is so shocking to hear — the state of Virginia would approve of something that is not permitted even in China!

Unfortunately, in my home state of New York, a very similar bill was passed. Upon its passage, you actually heard and saw clapping from inside the chamber. We also have seen more aggressive pro-abortion behavior here in Kentucky; I'm speaking of the recent [April 12] assault on Donna Durning in front of the EMW abortion center here in Louisville. This is just one example of how extreme the pro-abortion side is getting.

There are two reasons for this. The first is simple: They are scared. The Trump Administration has gotten several pro-life judges confirmed, and that has them thinking of the possibility of a world without *Roe v. Wade*.

As many reading this already know, repealing *Roe* would not outlaw abortion directly. It would make regulating abortion a matter to be decided in each state. This means that your average "blue" state, such as Oregon, theoretically could decide that babies can be killed right up to the moment before leaving the hospital.

In Kentucky, however, representatives have proposed that if *Roe* is repealed, abortion should never be allowed.

Pro-lifers must always remember that even if *Roe v. Wade* is overturned, the pro-abortion side won't quit. They will just shift their strategy. We must remember that our task, as pro-lifers, is to try to eliminate abortion. That requires changing women's hearts from sea to shining sea. When most people in

every state and locality recognize abortion as the evil that it is, *that's* when we really can say that our work is done.

Who is that calling out?

Even amid the languid dog days of summer, clamp-crushing, forceps-twisting violence inflicted by abortionists on helpless unborn children doesn't subside. In nearly a million instances each year, the "safe" refuge of a mother's womb schizophrenically disintegrates into a killing field where shards of arms, legs, spine and intestines are scattered. This is not a horror film. It's the scourge of legalized abortion in America.

This procedure, known as Dilation and Evacuation, or D&E, which includes a grisly reassembly of decimated baby body parts (to prevent a mother's bleeding or infection) occurs more than 500 times a year in Kentucky.

Attempts by pro-abortionists to destigmatize D&E, and other barbaric methods targeting the preborn, are utterly shameful in a sound and civilized society. The once-Democrat mantra of keeping abortion "safe, legal and rare" has been replaced with a radical insistence that abortion be permitted up to birth (even at taxpayers' expense), while simultaneously refusing to mandate that infant survivors of botched abortions be afforded medical care to save their young lives.

Still, these massive killings are draped in euphemisms such as "choice," "right" or "reproductive freedom" (every bit a misnomer). The American public, however, isn't buying such subterfuge. The latest Gallup poll (in May) shows 60% of Americans wanting all (21%) or almost all (39%) abortions made illegal.

The purpose of laws designed to stop abortions once a fetal heartbeat is detected — or to ban abortions based on gender, race, or disability — is a response to the centuries' old belief that abortion is objectively immoral and represents the intentional killing of a developing human being.

Legalized killing of unborn children has done nothing to improve the lives of women and families. Forty-six years of legalized abortion has exacerbated child abuse and "out of wedlock" births. It has fueled the "feminization of poverty" and

unleashed a flurry of unscrupulous abortionists operating unsafe, filthy and even fraudulent abortion mills.

The fallacy of abortion's being "health care," something low-income women desperately "need" or "want," is intellectually insulting and downright degrading. A 2015 Brookings Institute study shows that poor women have four times fewer abortions than the more well-to-do. The reason may not be because they can't afford one, but because lower income people traditionally lean pro-life.

"A baby, even when unplanned, is a great source of fulfillment for women in low-income" communities, research sociologist Kathryn Edin writes. "Women in a higher income bracket will be more seriously inconvenienced by pregnancy, as they stand to lose more money in caring for their children," Edin and her other colleagues conclude.

The recent trend by some abortion advocates to encourage women to "celebrate" their abortions is sickening. Contrast this with countless volunteers at more than 2,000 non-profit pregnancy resource centers who offer not only love and compassion, but also tangible material and spiritual support before, during and after pregnancy. This is a real reason for celebration!

Two-and-a-half million children are alive today — earning an education, playing sports, dating, marrying and having kids of their own — thanks to sound social policies, such as the Hyde Amendment, prohibiting tax dollars from subsidizing abortion. Moreover, 60,000 mothers each year have been spared the mental anguish, guilt, depression, even physical injury, that abortion at times inflicts on women.

But like the spiritual injunction *condemn the sin, not the sinner*, the pro-life movement remains committed to stigmatizing evil (abortion) — not shaming the women, who themselves often are victims of the pressure from others to abort.

Christina Bennett, whose mother walked out of a Connecticut abortion clinic 38 years ago, recently told a House Judiciary subcommittee that taking the lives of children through abortion *doesn't* "empower or strengthen" women.

"Abortion has left behind countless wounded women and men as it silenced millions of children who otherwise would have had a voice and lived out the purpose for their life," lamented Bennett.

The failure to promote adoption, the best alternative to abortion, is a stigma of epic proportions — a self-inflicted wound America needs to reverse.

Abby Johnson, the former Planned Parenthood executive whose witness of an ultrasound-guided abortion became a watershed moment for her conversion to the pro-life cause, spearheads *And Then There Were None*, a network of former abortion clinic workers who have deserted the industry. Her journey speaks volumes on what we in the pro-life movement have been all about:

"How can we condemn those who are truly blinded by evil? We can't. We shouldn't. How do we bring about conversion of those living in blindness? By love. By truth in charity. By offering forgiveness. By offering mercy. With prayer."

Editor's Corner

Dear Friend of Life,

In 2020, which is just five months away, Right to Life of Louisville, the first NRLC affiliate in Kentucky, will memorialize its 50th year in launching the war against abortion. Seems preposterous, doesn't it, that we have been laboring so many years in our quest to stop the legalized killing of millions of innocent preborn babies?

How clear, however, it is in *my* mind. As I look around our state of Kentucky and see the thousands and thousands of citizens who have taken up the mantle of defending human lives, I am struck by the love and dedication of this movement to defend the sanctity of all human life — a movement that becomes stronger each day.

We are not unique in the U.S.A. in this venture. Other states besides Kentucky organized in the late 1960s as they learned the horror perpetrated by some legislatures and governors — but we were among the very *first* states to organize. There were individuals who spoke out strongly and movingly on the horror of permitting the killing of innocent preborn babies, whose lives previously had been protected by law. We now (2019) have

aborted more than **60 million** innocent unborn babies.

This was well before the U.S. Supreme Court legalized abortion on January 22, 1973. Some states, including Kentucky, were seeing people call for passage of



laws that would overturn the prohibition of abortion in their states. Some of them were successful, some were not. But in 1973, seven members of the nine-member U.S. Supreme Court, in a 7-2 ruling, overturned all the protective laws on prohibiting abortion in our entire nation with a ruling that made abortion legal in all of our states for the full nine months of pregnancy — and for any “health” reason imaginable (*Roe v. Wade* and *Doe v. Bolton*).

The people were shocked, sickened and determined. We could not allow these barbaric rulings to stand. Now to the present. It is important to remember that our work must continue even *more* importantly in the months ahead. With the appointment of Neil Gorsuch and Brett Kavanaugh by President Donald Trump, and their confirmation by the U.S. Senate, the pro-abortion opposition has expressed its determination not to allow the U.S. Supreme Court to reverse its *Roe v. Wade* and *Doe v. Bolton* decisions.

We must strive even harder to educate the vast numbers of the public about the horrors of killing innocent babies in their mothers' wombs. It's difficult to believe that thousands of our citizens still do not know the truth.



United States Data and Trends

Lowest Levels in Decades

There are two basic sources on abortion incidence in the United States:

- The U.S. Centers for Disease Control (CDC) publishes yearly, but relies on voluntary reports from state health departments (and New York City, Washington, D.C.). It has been missing data from California, New Hampshire, and at least one other state since 1998.
- The Guttmacher Institute (GI) contacts abortion clinics directly for data but does not survey every year.
- Because it surveys clinics directly and includes data from all fifty states, most researchers believe Guttmacher's numbers to be more reliable, though Guttmacher still believes there may be as much as a 5% undercount in its most recent figures.

Both the CDC and Guttmacher show significant recent drops and even larger drops over the last 25 years.

- Total abortions dropped 27.8% from 1998 to 2015 with the CDC, and fell 42.4% from 1990 to 2014 with GI.
- Total abortions fell below 1 million for the first time in 38 years for Guttmacher when it reported 958,700 for 2013. That dropped further to 926,190 in 2014.
- The **abortion rate** for 2014 for GI was 14.6 abortions for every 1,000 women of reproductive age (15-44), half what it was in 1981 (29.3) and the lowest recorded since abortion was legalized in the U.S. in 1973.
- Guttmacher says there were 18.8 abortions for every 100 pregnancies ending in live birth or abortion in 2014, an **abortion ratio** lower than any since 1972.
- Guttmacher says that the number of abortion "providers" has dropped from a high of 2,918 in 1982 to 1,671 in 2014.
- Most of the reduction in abortions seen between 2008 and 2011 was in facilities performing a thousand or more abortions a year. A loss of 65 more such facilities from 2011 to 2014 was likely a big factor in the overall drop of 132,300 abortions seen in those three years.

Did You Know?

- During the first half of this year (January 1 through June 30), a total of 2,097 babies were aborted at the EMW Women's Surgical Center.
- A federal appeals court has upheld a Kentucky law allowing mothers a chance to see an ultrasound before aborting their babies. In 2017, the Kentucky legislature passed the bill, but U.S. District Court Judge David Hale struck it down shortly thereafter. Governor Matt Bevin appealed Judge Hale's ruling. This past June, Gov. Bevin proclaimed a "huge pro-life victory" when the 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals refused to have the entire court reconsider a ruling by a three-judge panel that upheld the law. (lifeneews.com)
- On July 15, undercover investigator David Daleiden of the Center for Medical Progress was vindicated in court on against the bogus lawsuit that Planned Parenthood filed after his videos exposed the abortion chain for selling body parts from aborted babies. Daleiden's win is a great victory for the First Amendment freedoms of citizen journalists. (lifeneews.com)
